Unemployment Rate in Santa Barbara County Remains Unchanged at 6.2 Percent for the Month of December 2013

The State Employment Development Department (EDD) released today the unemployment rate and other jobs data for the month of December 2013. The unemployment rate remained unchanged from a revised 6.2 percent in November 2013, and below the year-ago estimate of 7.7 percent. This compares with an unadjusted unemployment rate of 7.9 percent for California and 6.5 percent for the nation during the same period.

The county's unemployment ranking in December, compared to the other 57 counties in California, positioned Santa Barbara County, now in 9th place behind other counties such as: Marin (4.2%), San Mateo (4.6%), San Francisco (4.8%), Orange (5.2%), San Luis Obispo (5.6%), Santa Clara (5.7%), Sonoma (5.7%) and Napa (5.9%). The changes in ranking was due to Santa Barbara's unemployment figures remaining the same for December, as several of the other counties (which were tied for 5th and 6th place last month) experienced different changes in their unemployment numbers, causing them to separate from each other.

The total number of jobs in Industry sectors in Santa Barbara County decreased by 3,400 positions. Some of the industry sectors that experienced decreases in their labor force include government, with 300 jobs. Construction had a minus of 200 jobs. Manufacturing and Information both lost 100 positions. Industry sectors showing favorable gains included Trade, Transportation & Utilities and Professional & Business Services with an increase of 300 positions each. Educational & Health Services also showed an increase of 200 jobs, while Financial Activities and Leisure &Hospitality both gained 100 positions each.

Between December 2012 and December 2013, total employment in Santa Barbara County rose by 2,300 jobs or 1.2 percent. Some of the highlights for this period included:

- Industries posting substantial gains over the year included: Service Providing —up 1.6% or 2,500 jobs; Private Service Providing —up 1.8% or 2,000 jobs; Professional & Business Services—up 3.8% or 1,000 positions; Administrative & Support &Waste Services—up 700 jobs or 5.5%; Educational & Health Services—up 2.2% or 500 positions; Government —up 1.3% or 500 jobs; Health Care up 400 jobs or 2.5%; Health Care & Social Assistance up 300 jobs or 1.5%; Local Government —up 1.3% or 300 jobs.
- Other industries posting favorable gains over the year included: Educational Services—up 200 jobs or 7.1%; Manufacturing—up 200 jobs or 1.7%; Retail Trade —up 200 jobs or 1.1%; Professional, Scientific and Technical Services —up 200 jobs or 1.7%; State Government Educational—up 200 jobs or 1.9%; and Local Government Education—up 200 jobs or 1.6%.
- Some of the Industries that lost jobs for this period of time included: Manufacturing and Goods Producing minus 200 jobs and Durable Goods minus 100 positions. All other industries showed positive or no change in their labor force.

Santa Barbara County Workforce Investment Board (WIB) Director, Raymond L. McDonald commented, "The lack of change in the labor force for December is typical for the end of the year, as businesses begin planning for the upcoming year while assessing their current year's gains and losses." He added, "For January we should expect an increase in positions in the farm industry, as seasonal workers return to the fields and a slight decrease in nonfarm work, as consumers and companies settle for the New Year." Mr. McDonald concluded, "Even though our unemployment numbers remained unchanged in December, it is important for the community to work together on creating more jobs. A Department of Finance State Demographic Report released December 12, 2013 showed that Santa Barbara County had the third largest increase in population with 1.44% or 6,133 more residents with a total number of residents of 432,238."

The unemployment for most of our local cities also remained unchanged. The two cities that experienced decreases in unemployment included Buellton, which went from a 4.5% last month to 4.4% this month. The City of Guadalupe also decreased from 10.8% in November to 10.7% in December. All the other cities in the county remained unchanged for the month of December.

According to INJCJC, <u>US Initial Jobless Claims SA</u>, the weekly initial jobless claims totals used to calculate local and federal UI (unemployment insurance) ratings is determined by the actual number of people who have filed for Unemployment benefits for the first time in a given period. And the following five (5) eligibility criteria must be met in order to file for Unemployment benefits: 1. meet the requirement of time worked during a 1 year period (full time or not), 2. have become unemployed through no fault of your own (was not fired), 3. must be able to work, no physical or mental holdbacks, 4. must be available for work, and 5. must be actively seeking work.
