


2010-2020 Santa Barbara County Projection Highlights



Industry Employment, which includes self-employment, unpaid family workers, private household workers, farm, and nonfarm employment in Santa Barbara County, is expected to reach 230,100 by 2020, an increase of 13.5 percent over the 10-year projections period. Twelve of 13 nonfarm industry sectors are projected to grow between 2010 and 2020.




Total nonfarm employment is projected to grow by nearly 23,200 jobs by 2020. Sixty-nine percent of all projected nonfarm job growth is concentrated in four industry sectors.

- The educational services, health care, and social assistance sector is projected to add the most jobs, adding 5,200 jobs. The subsector adding the most job growth is health care and social assistance with 4,500 jobs.
- The professional and business services sector is expected to add 4,300 jobs with a growth rate of 19.9 through this period.
- The leisure and hospitality sector is estimated to add 3,500 jobs, led by the growth in accommodation and food services (3,000).
- The retail trade sector is predicted to add 3,100 jobs with almost a third of the growth concentrated in food and beverage stores (1,000).

Occupational Employment Projections forecast approximately 28,200 new jobs from industry growth and about 49,100 job openings from replacement needs for a combined total of more than 77,200 job openings.

The 50 occupations with the most job openings are forecasted to generate about 4,200 total job openings annually, which is about 55 percent of all job openings. The top three occupations with the most job openings are farmworkers and laborers, crop, nursery and greenhouse; cashiers; and waiters and waitresses. These occupations have median wages ranging from approximately \$9 to \$10 per hour and require less than a high school education. Higher-skilled occupations, requiring a bachelor's degree or higher, include elementary school teachers, except special education; accountants and auditors; and software developers, systems software.

The 50 fastest growing occupations anticipate an annual growth rate of 1.8 percent or higher. Occupations range from combined food preparation and serving workers, including fast food that require less than a high school education and earn more than \$9 per hour to pharmacists that require a doctoral or professional degree and pay median wages of more than \$64 per hour.
